Visa, Registration & Other Key Information

Firstly, if you are not from EU/EEA/Switzerland and a few other countries you will likely need to get a visa to live and work in Spain - check out Expatica for a summary of the different visas. Make sure that if you need to get your documents translated, you do so with a sworn/certified translator appointed by the Spanish Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

- Check the Immigration Spain to see if you need a visa.

As an expat, even when from EU/EEA/Switzerland, after moving to Spain and within 30 days you need to apply for a residence card/permit (Tarjeta de Residencia or TIE). You can apply for it at the Foreigner's Office (Oficina de Extranjeros) or the police station in the province where you're living.

After registering for a residence card you need to get a Foreigner's Identity Number (Número de Identificación de Extranjero or NIE). If you are an EU national you will get your NIE when you apply for your registration certificate. If however, you need a residence permit then you can only get the NIE after that.

Getting the right documents at the right place and knowing what to do can be a lot so you can find a guide here or an English-speaking lawyer.

You will use your NIE to open a bank account, get paid for your job and pay your taxes.

HOUSING

Long term rentals in Barcelona range from over 6 months, so from 12 months (usual minimum) up to 5 years (standard term). Leaving after 6 months will usually mean you have to pay a penalty. Looking for a place to stay will likely be your biggest challenge. For some rental options check out:


